Welcome to new members:

New computer admins were welcomed to the team.

Computer issues mentioned:

Missing or failed hard drive at Front

Possible video card fail at Montreal. Montreal also has a problem with non residents using the computers.

During the day non residents using the computers should be reported to management.

Timing software might help this problem. The board needs to approve of that though. (The Montreal board has not approved of this yet.)

Hi-Rise Wi-Fi project:

Aaron Smothers talked about the plan of action for this project.

The purpose of the project is to increase the wi-fi strength and range on the first floor and possibly the second floor.

Modem and router options were discussed. Important criteria in choosing a router are the number of devices that can connect to it and ease of use as a child device. If too few devices are supported then the signal will be poor with heavy use.

We need to select routers now so two devices can be purchased as test units.

Devices purchased will be current and chosen to be "future proof" (This means they should be good for three years at least.)

Three possible routers were put up for consideration. Prices range from \$180 to \$270. The routers hold different numbers of devices. Their ranges are also different. The most expensive router, the Asus AC2400 has the best specs. It is a very new product so it hasn't been tested much yet. Getting an enclosure for the routers was discussed. This would prevent theft. The enclosure wouldn't affect signal quality or strength.

The Netgear Nighthawk AC1900 is a good router option. That router is already in use at the family sites and at Montreal hi-rise.

We need to decide which router to go with.

Computer options were then discussed.

Be aware that lower end computers like the Dell Inspiron can't really be upgraded much. They are fine for home users who aren't interested in upgrading anything.

The first computer purchased would be for the Presidents Council office. The Acer Aspire sounds like a good option. It is upgradeable and has good specs.

Printer toner was discussed. Hi-rises are purchasing toner a whole lot. Purchasing the high yield TN-450 cartridge was suggested. That cartridge should print 2600 pages.

Toner can be purchased online at a good price. <u>eprintersolution.com</u> and <u>4inkjets.com</u> have good prices. They also take checks. You also can get toner cheaply at <u>amazon.com</u>. Someone will have to pay with a credit card and be reimbursed if you use that option.

Computer Class opportunities:

Computer basics classes are definitely needed.

Technology grant:
