


Want a hi-rise webpage?



What is a hi-rise webpage?

A page for your hi-rise is a space on the Presidents Council website to feature your building and what is going on there. It's a great way to connect with residents and let people from other hi-rises know about all the great things you're doing.

What kind of content should be on the page?

There is a wide variety of content you can have on your page. You could have minutes from Residents Council meetings, photos from building events, photographs and writing done by residents, a calendar of building events, information about your hi-rise. There may be the possibility of having a photo gallery and social media plug-ins.

Are there any restrictions?

Unfortunately, there are. Content should be kept to a PG or PG-13 level. Also, there may be restrictions on things like social media depending on PHA's rules. If you keep to showing off the best of your hi-rise and making useful information available you should be fine.

How will the page be hosted?

Hi-rise web pages will be hosted on the Presidents Council website. Each hi-rise that wants a page will get an address like this:
stphapresidentscouncil.org/seal.html.

Links on the pages will look like this: stphapresidentscouncil.org/sealminutes.html. Content will be submitted to the Presidents Council webmistress and she will post

it on the hi-rise pages. Content should be submitted in a form that is ready to post. This means minutes in Word document or PDF form and photos in digital form. Sending content by email is preferred. Send emails to sites@stphapresidentscouncil.org.

Anything else I should know?

Just a couple reminders. It is important to get permission before posting pictures of residents or their writing or artwork. Permission can be a photo release form or something simple that states that they give their permission for their work/image to be used that they sign. Be respectful of people's privacy and copyright when you choose what to submit.
